SUBJECT: 2025/26 DRAFT ANNUAL SERVICE PLAN

PURPOSE

The 2025/26 Draft Annual Service Plan is submitted to the Victoria Regional Transit Commission (the "Commission") for **INFORMATION**. The final 2025/26 Annual Service Plan will be brought to the Commission for Approval at the March 2025 meeting.

BACKGROUND

Each year, BC Transit develops an Annual Service Plan for the Victoria Regional Transit System (VRTS) to provide the Commission with a proposal for service improvements over the subsequent fiscal year.

In September 2024, via the Three-Year Expansion report, the Commission endorsed 30,000 annual service hours¹ and 12 buses for service expansion for the 2025/26 fiscal year². Based on BC Transit's annual Transit Evaluation Process (TEPs)³, this report also recommended the following key strategic investment priorities over the next three years:

- RapidBus and Frequent Transit Network (FTN) service improvements
- Development of the crosstown network on the Admirals/McKenzie corridor
- Simplifying and improving transit service on the Quadra corridor
- Improvements to YYJ Airport and Peninsula service
- Improvements to Sooke and other West Shore routes
- Introductory coverage service in rapidly developing communities

DISCUSSION

Table 1 provides an overview of the seasonal service changes planned for 2025/26 along with service improvements already accounted for within the base budget⁴ for 2025/26. Table 2 outlines the expansion plans associated with the 2025/26 expansion resources, anticipated to start in January of 2026. These proposed service changes are subject to change pending any unforeseen operational or resource challenges. Holiday service levels and special fare days are summarized in Appendix 1.

¹ Based on the expansion start date and the budget annualization process, only 7,500 hours of the approved expansion will be implemented in 2025/26. The full 30,000 hours will be implemented in the 2026/27 fiscal year.

² The Province's share of funding must be approved in February 2025 to support the implementation of the Commission's endorsed 2025/26 expansion.

³ TEPs ranks each expansion identified in BC Transit's strategic planning documents according to several factors including population served, potential ridership, environmental impact, accessibility, reconciliation and impact on service reliability.

⁴ Based on 2024/25 operational usage patterns, BC Transit will reallocate a significant portion of budgeted, operational directed service resources back into the budget for scheduled service, equating to an additional 11,415 annual service hours of scheduled service for the 2025/26 Fiscal year. Additionally, a portion of annualized hours from the 2024/25 Fiscal year's expansion are still available, contributing to additional hours of scheduled service improvements.

Route Class Changes

BC Transit staff make data-reliant changes to service levels on routes in alignment with the service standards and performance guidelines included within the 2013/14 Service Review. Changes to service levels within a route's service standards (associated with its route class) can be made without direct VRTC approval. For this reason, changes to route class are approved by the Commission as part of the Annual Service Plan. The following routes are recommended for classification change as part of the 2025/26 Annual Service Plan:

- Route 3 from Local Transit Network-Ridership (LTN-R) to Local Transit Network-Coverage (LTN-C)
 - Route 3 has been consistently not meeting its performance guidelines for the last year. Further, Route 3 is also not meeting the minimum service standards for LTN-R service, and its recent performance does not rationalize further investment to achieve those minimum service standards.
- Route 30 from FTN to LTN-R
 - O Routes 30 and 31 collectively provide approximate FTN service levels along Carey Road between Highway 1 and Ralph Street. Route 30 is currently served at LTN-R service levels and achieves LTN-R performance expectations, whereas Route 31 is currently served at LTN-R service levels but achieves FTN performance expectations. The recently endorsed Regional Corridor Strategy identified Route 31 as the planned FTN corridor between Uptown and Royal Oak Exchange, as it better aligns with planned future density within Saanich and with existing and anticipated future ridership levels.

• Route 58 from LTN-C to LTN-R

Route 58 serves the rapidly growing Westhills neighbourhood. Fall weekday
performance is far exceeding LTN-C expectations, now achieving LTN-R expectations on weekdays. Service levels are also meeting LTN-R standards outside of Saturday service levels.
